Celebrating 21 Years - 1989 - 2010

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he Vanilla Bean Café is a family run restaurant in CT's northeast Quiet Corner. On August 26th, it will be 21 years since brothers Barry, Brian Jessurun,

along with their mother and sister Eileen, opened a sandwich and ice cream shop in a restored barn on the corner of routes 97, 169, and 44. Early on, their mother worked in the kitchen and now it is easy to imagine how proud she would be to see the cafe still in operation today.

Whether coming for a bite to eat or staying to see the show, customers find the Vanilla Bean an easy place to be. With

wooden floors below and exposed beams above, the restau-

rant has a warm and comfortable feeling. The main dining room is a gallery displaying artwork by local artists. Cafe life is depicted in a four panel installation in the original

> dining room. Customers share in a sense of belonging here as they peruse the history, accolades, pictures and stories that decorate the walls.

People sit and chat, sip tea, drink beer or wine and linger as long as they like. With 21 years behind them and hopefully many m ore ahead, this corner cafe has plenty to offer. The Vanilla Bean Café is a public place where people can really feel

wners and managers at The Vanilla Bean Cafe are accustomed to hearing compliments about the staff, which is not surprising considering the exceptional group of people working in the kitchen and behind the counter at this popular local establishment. Customers enjoy patronizing an establishment where employees smile and appear to be genuinely having a fun time at work. Of course, happy employees are the ones most likely to well represent VBC standards for preparing and serving quality food, providing friendly and efficient service, and interacting in a relaxed, casual and comfortable environment. Happy employees naturally deliver exactly what it takes to create happy customers.

People fascinated with the cafe culture may wonder, "Who are the people working at VBC and where do they come from?" Barry Jessurun, VBC co-owner answers "we don't find them, we make them." He developed the "continuous transaction loop" philosophy as a tool for building and maintaining productive cohesive teams on his staff. Barry's philosophy has served the Bean well. In 15 years, he has not run a help wanted ad which he believes attract people who are not connected to the community nor familiar with the Bean culture.

When it comes to selecting candidates for positions at the cafe, Barry finds his first choices among friends and former employees. He encourages applicants who are related to a

favorite customer, a current employee or a former employee and always enjoys hiring applicants who are brothers, sisters, daughters, sons, or people who somehow qualify as leaves grown or fallen from the Vanilla Bean Cafe extended family tree.

Barry encourages all members of his team to join him in creating the VBC culture. He strives to help them adopt the attitude that they "work for themselves and for their own future self." This practice makes their work more meaningful and offers them the opportunity to make recommendations. They are encouraged to build their own teams, choosing shifts and coworkers that optimize their productivity. Survivor jokes surface in the kitchen - it's always possible to get voted off the island.

The Weakest Link is another game show management uses to help engage every employee. Once staff are engaged, they can be mobilized to improve. Then it is up to the individual to keep it going and continue to grow in the role as an effective employee. If an employee needs to be 'managed,' that employee cannot remain. This rarely happens. The culture of working as a team to create a positive and friendly environment for both themselves and the customer is very strong, and most new employees take to it quite easily. The 'right' kind of person is attracted to work in this environment, based on the story that exists through our current employees. Simply put, our staff Rocks!



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

Songwriter Sessions is a monthly music series dedicated to the craft of songwriting. Performances take place on the second Friday of each month from 7-9 PM at The Vanilla Bean Café. The series, hosted by Lisa Martin, features monthly performances by three local or regional songwriters. Saturday - 24 - Mark Erelli & Jeffrey Foucault

Since the 2001 release of his critically acclaimed debut,



Miles from the Lightning, WI native Jeffrey Foucault has built an independent career touring extensively in the US, Canada, and the UK. His 2006 release, Ghost Repeater garnered praise from publications such as The

New Yorker, No Depression, MOJO, The Chicago-Sun Times, and The Irish Times. Jeffrey's repertoire is pure Americana poetry, a mix of country blues, country, and folk music that the Boston Globe noted for its "rolling, reflective ballads (that) shimmer with blue shade, everyday images, and the quiet strength of hard-earned wisdom."

With twelve CD releases of original music, J P Jones is




Rhode Island's most prolific independent recording artist. A classically trained composer who grew up with the rock and soul music of the 1960s, Jones' recorded work has been com-

Kathleen Pemble has worked as a performing songwriter full-time for the past 7 years. On December 24th 2007, she severed the all the tendons in her right index finger and 8 weeks later, fell and shattered her right elbow.

Saturday - 18 - Dana Cooper

Out of the heartland of America, stomping grounds of



Truman and Twain, **Dana Cooper** was playing his music in Kansas City clubs by the age of 16. Leaving behind a college art scholarship Dana toured the country and landed in Los Angeles. Cooper has been

named Best Songwriter in Houston, was nominated Best Male Vocalist by the Kerrville Music Foundation and nominated for their Hall of Fame. His songs have been recorded by top-notch artists Maura O'Connell, Jonell Mosser, Susan Werner, Jen Cohen, Christine Albert, Trout Fishing in America, Pierce Pettis and Shake Russell. Cooper has customarily named his albums after song titles. Dana's latest release, 'The Conjurer' departs from that tradition, and rightly so, as it's a singular album within the veteran singer-songwriter's canon. "The idea of a conjurer, of someone who pulls something out of the air, makes me laugh," says Dana Cooper. "It definitely describes how I see myself as a songwriter and performer. There's a mystery and magic in songwriting. You have to keep believing you can pull the next idea out of a hat."

Sunday - 19 - Bill Staines

Bill Staines travels across North America, singing his songs and delighting audiences at festivals,




songs and delighting audiences at festivals, folksong societies, colleges, concerts, clubs and coffeehouses. A New England native, Bill became involved with the Boston-Cambridge folk scene in the early '60s. He quickly became a popular performer in the

Boston area. In 1971, after one of his performances, a reviewer for The Phoenix stated that Bill was "simply Boston's best performer." A decade later, the annual Reader's Poll of *The Boston Globe* selected him as a favorite performer. In 1991, Bill entered his forth decade as a folk performer with an international reputation as an artist. Singing mostly his own songs, he has become one of the most popular singers on the folk music circuit today and averages around 200 concert dates a year. Bill weaves a magical blend of wit and gentle humor into his performances, and as one reviewer wrote, "he has a sense of timing to match the best stand-up comic."

Saturday - 25 - Geoff Bartley

Geoff Bartley writes, "My music is a mix of blues, folk and roots jazz. I play fingerstyle acoustic guitar and harmonica to support my bluesy baritone "singing". I'm also getting better...slowly... with traditional bluegrass and old-time flatpicking

styles. The folk press has called me "folk music at its best" (*Music Reviews Quarterly*), "a brilliant songwriter and a world-class guitarist" (*The Boston Globe*), a "local legend" (*All Music Guide*) and "spiritual godfather" (*Dirty Linen*) of the Boston folk scene.





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Our Pricing Practices

- 1. Sales Tax Included Our prices include the 6% Connecticut Sales Tax. The prices listed on the menu are exactly what you pay. Our prices may seem to be inflated; however, a \$8.50 menu item is actually \$8.02 + \$.48 sales tax. Furthermore, this practice makes it easier for the customer, especially if that customer is a child who has exact change for a cookie. What you see is exactly what you pay what could be simpler?
- 2. Not Market Standard Pricing We are not trying to fool the customer into thinking that \$7.95 is less expensive than \$8.00. We find this type of pricing insulting to our customers. However, the reason it is used so extensively around the nation is that it works effectively. We don't like that practice, and we also like to believe that our clientele is not so easily fooled.
- 3. No Pennies, Dimes or Nickels Because our prices include tax and we do not price in the standard way, we do not have to use pennies, dimes or nickels. This is a service to both the customer and to us. We don't give you lots of change, and we only have to use quarters and fifty-cent pieces. This also helps our staff to be more efficient performing transactions, which saves time and money. An added bonus is that we don't have to count change at the end of the business day.
